MINUTES OF REGULAR MEETING SUGAR CITY COUNCIL THURSDAY, APRIL 13, 2023

Building Inspector Quinton Owens was excused.

CONSENT AGENDA:

MOTION: It was moved by Councilwoman Ball and seconded by Councilwoman Nielsen to approve the Consent Agenda; motion carried.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT REPORT:

Fentanyl and Narcan: Madison County Emergency Manager Robert Kohler reported that nasal Narcan is available free to the city for use in suspected Fentanyl or opiate overdose in adults and children. Recently, overdose deaths have increased dramatically. Fentanyl is extremely dangerous and now has been found laced in money. Narcan is safe to use and can reverse a Fentanyl overdose and save lives. Mr. Kohler will schedule a time to train office staff and council members on how to administer the drug and will make the drug available to have on hand.

Flooding Concerns and Preparations: The spring outlook reports show that snow levels are up 110% - 130% from last year. While average temperatures are 6 degrees below normal there is concern of flooding. Sheet flooding is predicted at 88% and stream flooding at 8%. Sandbags and sand are available to the public. Public Works Director Arlynn Jacobson will scout out preapproved areas for sandbags.

Emergency App: An Emergency App available to the public and leaders are encouraged to use it for reporting any type of natural disasters. It offers live up-to-date information on issues effecting Madison County. More information can be found on the Madison County's website or on Sugar City's website.

SUGAR SALEM IMPACT AREA FLYER: An informational flyer to help the public understand the desires for Sugar City and Salem's growth together, autonomy, and identity will be distributed to Salem and Sugar City residents. A special committee consisting of key individuals will help in putting together the flyer and verbiage to be approved by the city council. It is estimated it will take about \$2,000 to complete the project.

MOTION: It was moved by Councilwoman Nielsen to provide funds of up to \$2,000 to

produce, print, and deliver the flyers. Motion dies for lack of a second.

MOTION: It was moved by Councilwoman Ball and seconded by Councilwoman Nielsen to move forward in support of producing a better flyer draft for council review; motion carried.

TETON HEIGHTS FINAL PLAT: Planning and Zoning Administrator Kurt Hibbert reported that all department reviews have been completed for the final plat and ready for council approval. The council had questions on maintenance and rentals.

MOTION: It was moved by Councilman Baird and seconded by Councilman Dayley to approve the Teton Heights Final Plat with corrections; motion carried.

FIRE DISTRICT CODE: The first discussion on the Fire District Code revisions was done with Madison Fire Department Lieutenant Stan Crittenden. Building Inspector Quinton Owens was excused. Mr. Crittenden asked that two new items be adopted along with the other revisions:

- NFP 1142 This standard identifies a method of determining the minimum water supply necessary for structural fire-fighting purposes in areas where it has been determined that there is no water or inadequate water for firefighting.
- 903.2.8 requires all 4-plexes to be sprinkled.

PUBLIC COMMENTS: No report

PLANNING AND ZONING REPORT:

Planning and Zoning Administrator and City Planner Kurt Hibbert reported on the following items:

RV Park Public Hearing: The public hearing for the RV Park expansion held on March 16, 2023 was recommended with five conditions that needed to be completed before council review. None were completed. The conditions with the previous owner are also expected to be met. Currently the RV Park houses "permanent residents" which is a safety hazard. Sugar City does not have an RV Code which has made efforts to direct the development difficult. The new current zone is Regional Commercial. However, the prior Highway Commercial zone will be honored or grandfathered in. Summarized below are items that need to be addressed on the RV Park:

- Detailed information on the "bath house" and "amenities"
- Addition of a Sugar City RV Code
- Temporary residency defined
- Surety bond
- Development Agreement

East Parkway Corridor: The 2022 Transportation Plan has been adopted by Madison County and Rexburg and needs to be adopted by Sugar City by resolution as well. However, the 2022 Transportation Plan does not show the correct adopted plans for the East Parkway Corridor for Sugar City. The mayor asked that we review 2022 Transportation Plan with the last correct East Parkway Corridor plan adoption for Sugar City and move forward from there.

Highway 33 Access: Developers north of 3rd North and the new Jr. High School have asked for two accesses onto E Highway 33. However, the proposed accesses would create additional hazards. Mr. Hibbert recommends that truck traffic come out on a frontage road instead.

Urban Renewal Report: Sugar City has substantial lands involved in Rexburg's Urban Renewal District. It is important to attend and take part in the district meetings.

YELLOWSTONE FINAL PLAT: The final plat was reviewed and recommended for approval. **MOTION:** It was moved by Councilwoman Nielsen and seconded by Councilwoman

Ball to approve the Yellowstone Townhomes Final Plat; motion carried

RP PARK EXPANSION FINDINGS OF FACT: (see above)

MOTION: It was moved by Councilwoman Nielsen and seconded by Councilwoman Ball to table the council review until next meeting; motion carried

DIVISION #4 SURETY LIEN AGREEMENT: The Division #4 Surety Lien Agreement was reviewed and recommended for approval.

MOTION: It was moved by Councilwoman Nielsen and seconded by Councilwoman Ball to approve the Division #4 Surety Lien Agreement. Thereupon, the Clerk called roll upon the motion.

Railroad Easement Agreement:

MOTION: It was moved by Councilman Dayley and seconded by Councilwoman Ball to approve the pre-flood and early 1980's Utility Easement Agreement with Eastern Idaho Railroad. Thereupon, the Clerk called roll upon the motion.

South Highway 33 Speed Reduction: Speed will be reduced to 25 mph around the "S" curve south of town and increase to 35 mph up past the turn off to 5th S under construction.

Truck Purchase: A new used truck was purchased for \$7,000 to replace the 1970 Chevy pickup after the transmission went out.

South Life Station Panel Replacement: The South Lift Station panel needs to be replaced. Mr. Jacobson will get quotes for the next meeting.

Sidewalk Grant Report: JM Concrete is well underway on the sidewalk project funded by the Children Pedestrian Safety Grant.

GENERAL BUSINESS:

ARBOR DAY PROCLAMATION

MOTION: It was moved by Councilwoman Nielsen and seconded by Councilman Dayley to proclaim Friday, May 12th, 2023 as Arbor Day in the City of Sugar City. Thereupon, the Clerk called roll upon the motion.

Thereupon, the Mayor declared the motion passed. A copy of said proclamation is attached hereto marked "Attachment 1".

Proposed Historic Preservation Room: After discussion it was thought that the garage would be inadequate for the Historic Preservation Commission office. Access to city storage would be hampered, space is limited, water and rodents are a problem. Many expensive improvements and renovations would have to be done.

Farmer Merchant Banquet: A table of 12 has been purchased by the city. Tickets for spouses will be purchased individually. The Farmer Merchant Banquet is scheduled for Thursday, April 27, 2023 and will be noted as a work meeting since it falls on the next council meeting night.

CALENDARED ITEMS:

MAYOR AND COUNCIL SALARY ORDINANCE NO. 383_2023: (Mayor and Council Salary Revisions) The council adopted the revised mayor and council salaries effective January 1, 2024.

Ordinance No. 383_2023 was read by title and reviewed by the council on at least three different meetings:

"AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTIONS 1-5-4 AND 1-6-4 OF THE SUGAR CITY MUNICIPAL CODE TO INCREASE THE SALARIES OF THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL, REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES AND PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH AND PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE."

It was moved by Councilwoman Nielsen and seconded by Councilwoman Ball to adopt Ordinance 383_2023. Thereupon, the clerk called roll upon the motion.

Ordinance No. 383_2023 was thereupon declared by the mayor to have been duly passed by not less than two-thirds of the council. The clerk will publish Ordinance No. 383_2023 in summary

CITY UTILITY FIBER: Dave Thompson reported on the proposed city fiber backbone and working on the following:

- Utility code revision to protect city owned fiber
- Existing excavation activities to reduce fiber cable costs
- Website with survey to help with grant points
- Maps
- Key technicians to help with project

A Special Council Meeting is set for Wednesday, April 19, 2023 at 6:30 p.m. to read the grant application for approval.

MAYOR AND COUNCIL REPORTS:

Arbor Day Celebration: Tree and Beautification will meet again on the 20th to finalize the Arbor Day preparations.

Easter Egg Hunt: The event was held in the old Jr. High Gym because of the late snow and was well attended. Approximately 337 children attended and over a thousand eggs were given out as well as prizes.

Sugar Days: Plans are well underway for Saturday, June 17, 2023. Stone's Town & Country will sponsor the breakfast as usual moved to 8:00 a.m. – 10:00 a.m. with the Sugar Days event following right after. A live band will also be part of the event. Citizen of the Year and Public Servant awards will be awarded. The nominees will be on the next agenda.
