**MAILBOXES - NEW OR REPLACEMENTS:** If you are going to install or replace a new mailbox this fall, we want to remind you that mailboxes are not allowed on city sidewalks. If you have questions about replacing a mailbox currently on a sidewalk, contact our Public Works Department for more information. Please be aware of the postal code for dimensions and proper placement of posts and mailboxes. This will also help our public works department when it comes time for snow removal. Proper height and distance from road will help eliminate the possibility for a snowplow coming in contact with your mailbox.

The best mailbox supports are stable but bend or fall away if a car hits them.

The Federal Highway Administration recommends:

- A 4" x 4" wooden support or a 2"-diameter standard steel or aluminum pipe.
- Avoid unyielding and potentially dangerous supports, like heavy metal pipes, concrete posts, and farm equipment (e.g., milk cans filled with concrete).
- Bury your post no more than 24" deep.
- Position your mailbox 41" to 45" from the road surface to the bottom of the mailbox or point of mail entry.
- Place your mailbox 6" to 8" back from the curb. If you do not have a raised curb, contact your local postmaster for guidance.
